PRESIDENTS' DAY PROGRAM

SLATED FOR FEBRUARY 23rd

"PRESIDENTS AND FIRST LADIES IN WHITTIER... AND OTHER FOREIGN PLACES" will be the first RSGHS members program of the new year, 1992.

RSGHS members Joe Da Rold and Bernard Hardy have merged their creative talents to develop an entertaining musical package. The 45-minute program is a light-hearted, yet moving, look back at the personal and international lives of the two First Ladies who lived briefly in Whittier, showing the impact that each had on her husband and her country.

Featured in the program is Georgia Gumper, singing songs from two of Irving Berlin's musicals. "Mr. President" and "Call Me Madam." Georgia takes on the role of a "singing First Lady", providing a musical counterpoint to Joe's historical narrative. Bernard accompanies at the piano.

The program, written by Joe, has garnered rave notices each time the talented trio has performed it. The Woman's Club of Whittier called it "the most entertaining program we've had all year!" It is scheduled for Sunday, February 23, 1992 at 2:00 p.m. at the Hathaway Ranch Museum. Reservations are requested by calling 310/944-6563 or 310/944-7372.

ANNUAL AWARDS PICNIC

Seventy-five people gathered at Heritage Park on Sunday, September 22nd, to honor fellow volunteers with awards, place favors, and entertainment at the annual Hathaway Ranch Museum picnic. Jean Hathaway, President of Rancho Santa Gertrudes Historical Society, welcomed the group, then turned the program over to Caroline Long, chairman of the Hathaway "Ranch Hands."

In recognition of their volunteer service hours over the

last twelve months, 30 volunteers were presented with straw cowboy hats, which will become part of their tour uniforms. Museum Director Nadine Hathaway presented special awards to Marvin Carlzen, Caroline Long, Jack Johnson, and Henry Lynn, each of whom logged from 260 to 560 hours. The total number of volunteer hours contributed this year by all docents was over 3350.

Acting Director, Joe Da Rold, announced that Nadine had recently been selected to receive the 1991 Lifetime Achievement Award from the California Council for the Promotion of History.


The 1991 "GERTIE" Award, presented each year to a resident of the Rancho Santa Gertrudes area who has contributed substantially to the preservation of history, went to Virginia Mathony for ten years of volunteer commitment with a variety of area-wide historical groups, and for authoring a new book on the history of Whittier entitled, "WHITTIER REVISITED."

The 1991 Awards for the RSGHS Annual Historical Photograph Contest were swept by former RSGHS President, Joe Da Rold, who won First, Second, and Third prizes, and one Honorable Mention. Two Honorable Mentions were also won by Nadine Hathaway.

This year's judges were John Nairn (Matern Family descendent and member of SFS Historical Committee), Melvina McLaughlin (Norwalk artist), and Regina Phelan (La Habra Heights resident and descendent of early Pioneer family of the area).

The contest adds about 40 photographs annually to the Museum's growing collection of over 5000 historical photographs of the SFS area.

Following the presentation of awards, a special harp-decorated birthday cake and giant birthday card were given to Ruth Grams on the occasion of her 85th birthday. Ruth is currently a member of the RSGHS Board of Directors. Entertainment was provided throughout the afternoon by singer Tom Di Ponzio, the hot-and-cold buffet prepared by Silvius Catering, and the cake baked by Catering by Linda.

MEMBERS IN THE NEWS

At the annual meeting of the California Council for the Promotion of History, Nadine Hathaway was presented a Lifetime Achievement Award. The award was a beautiful framed watercolor painting of the Heritage Park Carriage Barn, recognizing the role Nadine played in the effort to have the City of Santa Fe Springs preserve the Slusher Estate as an historic property.

The presentation was made in tandem by Joe Da Rold, who gave an overview of Nadine's life and historical interests, and Will Hathaway, who made a uniquely personal tribute to Nadine. Under the heading "Terms of Endearment," Will shared a handful of phrases that had become signposts in his life. Here are the "Terms of Endearment," along with Will's commentary:

"UNDERTHE TABLE" - "Some things you need to know about this woman: From very early on, I found that my mother allowed things to take place under the table. However, this did not come without some restrictions. I and my younger siblings were instructed to play quietly under the table during community meetings she hosted. She may have had a trickle-down theory that our own sense of community would grow from this practice."

"GO CHASE YOURSELF" - "When she was not conducting community meetings, feeding and tending a minimum of seven others, she often sought a few moments, even at the sink, clothesline, or while skimming milk, to contemplate her world, and if one of us complained of insufficient activities, we were advised that we might go chase ourselves. In that statement, she hoped we might pursue our own sense of wonder that did not require her attendance."

"I'M SAVING THAT" - An expression of my father's was "I'm saving that!" My father went to heaven while saving some timbers he might have had some plans for at a later date. My father saved everything. His 76 years of saving was a perfect starting point for my mother to establish a hands-on Ranch Museum, concentrating on the early history of Santa Fe Springs."

"DO SOMETHING WITH THESE" - My father was also persistent in bringing my mother great quantities of perishables-fruits, nuts, kids - with the command: "Here, Nadine do something with these." She did, and continues to do so. But what has she done with these? Well, for the community, she is keeping its hands on history. For my father, she has figured out what to do with all the five acres of stuff. And for myself and my siblings, she has helped to keep alive that sense of wonder."


And finally,

"BEFORE YOUR MOTHER" - "When I was young and my grandfather Jesse had finally approved of something I had done, he would use the expression,' If you keep that up, you will be a man before your mother.' Well, Jesse, it's a hard act to follow."

EXCELSIOR!

Two items related to Excelsior Union High School in Norwalk have come to light in the Museum Archives. The first is Dick Hathaway's 1930 diploma from EUHS. Of particular interest is the diploma presentation cover, made of sheepskin. Many of us have heard the word "sheepskin" used synonymously with "diploma." Now we know the connection. These items have been placed on exhibit in the "School" Room of the Museum.

The second EUHS item, shown below, is somewhat more exotic—a flyer for the Girls' Glee Club performance of "Zurika, The Captive Gypsy Princess". If we have any readers who can share memories of this event, be sure to let us know.



Delivering The Mail

From Fulton Wells to Santa Fe Springs

Although mail service was available as early as 1867 from the Los Nietos Post Office, it was not until eleven years later that the first local post office was established: the Sulphur Wells Post Office (October 11, 1878)

One suspects that Dr. Fulton may have been the most active proponent for the new service, for his new commercial enterprise was to be heavily dependent on revenue from out-of-state tourists.

It is not known if Sulphur Wells was a name already in common use, or whether it might have been the suggestion of Dr. Fulton. In any event, it was short-lived, and Fulton came up with a better name. The post office operated from a livery barn for six months, until it was moved in April of 1879 to the newly-built Fulton Hotel and re-named the Fulton Wells Post Office.

Until the recent discovery of an envelope with a Fulton Wells postmark, history had obscured the existence of the Fulton Wells Post Office. (The date on the postmark is illegible, but it was probably about 1885.) The United States Postal Service Archives has now confirmed that it operated for nine years, from 1879 to 1888.



This early envelope with a Fulton Wells postmark is addressed to Lola McCarric. Lola's mother, Sarah Koontz, had died in Idaho from Scarlet Fever during the treacherous trip west from their home in Pennsylvania, so Lola lived with The Koontz family in Santa Fe Springs. In 1902 Lola married Jesse E. Hathaway, and thus began the Hathaway Ranch.

Historical notes of R. F. Hathaway indicate that at some point this post office operated from the home of Eve Porter, who with her husband, owned a store on Telegraph Road, East of Four Corners. The change of location probably occurred during the renovation of the Fulton Hotel after its sale to Pacific Land Improvement Co.

On February 23, 1888, the post office was moved into the Koontz General Store. located at Four Corners, where it was established as the Santa Fe Springs Post Office. The store, run by brother and sister, William and Emma Koontz, was a regular stop for the Banning Stagecoach. Another sister, Jennie, carried the mail from the Santa Fe Railway station to the store for sorting.

William and Emma eventually gave up the store when a gusher came in from a well on their property, spraying their house with mud, sand, and oil.

Although a letter written to Emma Koontz in 1889 was addressed to her at Fulton Wells, within a few years letters were being addressed to the family at Santa Fe Springs. By the 1920's "Norwalk" was being given as the mailing address for the the homes, but this was to ensure home delivery. The little post office at Four Corners had been officially established as a "4th Class" post office and provided no carrier service.

It continued in business until the end of 1955, whereupon it was reduced to the status of a station, under the Norwalk Post Office. By dint of its existence, however, the United States Post Office continued the Santa Fe Springs postmark, making it one of the oldest continually used cancellation marks in California.

After the incorporation of the City of Santa Fe Springs in 1957, the post office moved to a storefront in the Santa Fe Springs Shopping Center at 10016 Orr & Day Road. It was re-established as the Santa Fe Springs Post Office on September 1, 1958, with Nancy Barranger recorded as the new Postmaster. Julian Grembla became Postmaster in 1961, overseeing the move of postal operations into the existing modern facility at the SFS Town Center on Telegraph Road, in July of 1969.

Summing Up

Despite the variety of names associated in one way or another with the mineral springs resort, the United States Post Office has recognized only three: Sulphur Wells, Fulton Wells and Santa Fe Springs.

HISTORICAL UPDATES...


Eleanor Mekeel Massey sent a second letter from Sweden to clarify some textual errors in Marie Pike's article in "Settlers. Volume II." On page 47, the "grandpa" and "grandma" referred to are John and Christena Nordstrom. Esther was their daughter (and mother of Eleanor), not John's sister, as mentioned on page 51. "Uncle Carl" was John's older brother. The two brothers married sisters, so Christena's sister was Carl's wife, Anna.

Joe Da Rold points out that the "Mr. and Mrs. Koontz", referred to in Esther Mekeel's article as the proprietors of the grocery store, were in fact William and Emma, who were brother and sister. Recent research he has done on the Koontz family indicates that the 1869 date of the Koontz General Store (p.40) is about ten years too early.

Despite the fact that two copies of that photo in the museum's collection are dated 1868 and 1869. Martin and Mary Ann Koontz had their 12th child in 1871 up in Oregon and did not migrate to Southern California until 1875. Since they lived briefly in Independence, California, and in La Canada, they likely did not arrive in Fulton Wells until April of 1879.



In 1919 this huge "Estampes" pumpkin weighed in at 273 lbs. setting a World record for size and weight. Standing (from rear to front) are J. Elwood Hathaway, Richard F. Hathaway and Julian I. Hathaway. This image later became the logo for the Los Angeles County Fair held in Pomona. Eventually the three boys were dropped from the Fair's emblem, but the pumpkin still remains.
